1990 Controversy Over Canada: The Aftermath

February of 1990 is a date that lives in infamy for the National Wrestling Alliance as reigning NWA World Heavyweight Champion Michael 'PS' Hayes refused to defend the championship in Canada against number one contender Bret Hart. Hayes, who claimed he was not contractually obligated to defend the title in Calgary (due to WCCW's unofficial hold on the title), was then stripped of the Championship by the National Wrestling Alliance for failing to meet his obligations as Champion of the organization.

But the real controversy came when Michael Hayes refused to relinquish the physical title belt back to the NWA. Stating that the NWA could keep his \$150,000 collateral payment on the title, the former champion claimed that the physical belt belonged to him.

Not wanting to get tied up into a lengthy court battle, the NWA instead ordered for a new belt be designed and produced. Michael Hayes was now black listed from the NWA, and in March Bret Hart won a tournament final over Davey Boy Smith to be the first wrestler to ever wear the "Big Gold" version of the NWA Title.

It is now April of 1990, and this is where our story begins...

Cast of Promotions:

National Wrestling Alliance Members:

NWA: Calgary Stampede (Cult) - Undoubtedly the flagship promotion of the National Wrestling Alliance as 1990 inches forward, Stampede is built on the Hart family and the graduates of their world renown 'Hart Family Dungeon' Training Program. The promotion relies on a product of straight forward, heavily-athletic matches, and it is that approach that the NWA finds Stampede so favorable for. After the controversy surrounding "The Hayes Incident" the NWA World Heavyweight title is where the NWA wants it, and around Bret Hart's waste. Two of the title's top contenders, Curt Hennig and Davey Boy Smith. As well, former champion 'Millionaire' Ted DiBiase has relocated to the white north and hopes to add yet another reign to his resume. That is of course, if he can work out the recent problems with his servant Virgil who has inadvertently cost DiBiase a number of big match ups. Then there's the reigning NWA Canadian Heavyweight Champion Bad News Allen who has tore through any and all challengers. While there is plenty a big name on the roster, the future also looks bright for the company as young stars like Owen Hart, Brian Pillman, Chris Jericho and Lance Storm have recently been catching fans attentions with stunning performances.

Honolulu Championship Wrestling (Regional) – HCW is a promotion that relies on a very traditional and family friendly approach to wrestling, booking clear cut good and bad guys, good versus evil and the like. Recently, Skandor Akbar has brought his Devistation Inc. faction who look to take over the company. Wahoo McDaniel, Don Muraco, Superfly Jimmy Snuka and even Superstar Billy Graham have spots on Honolulu's roster.

Internacional De Lucha Azteca (Regional) - The only show in town south of the border in Mexico, ILA recently ran their Rey De Reyes Event which was won by a very young and promising star in Konnan El Barbaro. The company is seeing a bit of a revolution in styles happening as talented young stars such as Sabu, Robbie V, El Scorpio, Jinsei Shinzaki, Psicosis and a number of others are taking to the ropes and performing dazzling stunts that both wow and amaze crowds. Many feel that this 'high flying' style is that of the future.

Memphis Championship Wrestling (Regional) – Home of Jerry 'The King' Lawler, many fans were recently disappointed when 'The King' failed to keep his promise of winning the NWA Title Tournament and bringing the gold back to Memphis. However, the current Southern Heavyweight Champion is one of the top contenders and is likely to receive a shot. The past few months of the organization have seen a bitter feud between Sid Vicious and Eddie Gilbert, that started when Gilbert returned to Memphis three months ago and targeted Sid Vicious for the reason of simply being the biggest dog in the yard. The company has a solid future ahead of it with second generation stars such as Jeff Jarrett, Brian Lawler, and The Armstrong Brothers beginning to catch fire.

NWA Golden West (Regional) – Still a fledgling company at just under a year old, NWA Golden West uses a glitz and glamor approach as they associate themselves with the California and Hollywood setting. The promotion has a number of big names working for them including NWA West Coast Heavyweight Champion Rowdy Roddy Piper, 'Mr. Wonderful' Paul Orndorff, Jake 'The Snake' Roberts and King Kong Bundy. The promotion thus far has put out a colorful, over the top series of events with flamboyant characters such as Koko B. Ware, The High Rollers, 'Diamond' Dallas Page, Scotty The Body and Kevin Vegas.

Ric Flair Promotions (Cult) – The recent talk of RFP has been the eventful Clash of the Champions show that among other things saw Barry Windham defeat both 'The World's Strongest Man' Bill Kazmaier and Sting enroute to defeating Ricky Steamboat for the NWA Mid-Atlantic Heavyweight Championship. What should have been a joyous occasion was marred in controversy because RFP owner Ric Flair, who has been known to use his powers to help his own personal agenda came out and distracted both Steamboat and the referee before allowing Windham to hit Steamboat with a loaded boot and capture the belt. It is not yet known if Windham is aligned with Flair or not, as Flair had been doing his best to make Steamboat's title reign come to an end for a while now. The company has also seen an intense rivalry between Arn Anderson and former NWA World Heavyweight Champion Terry Funk as well. During their match at Clash of the Champions, Funk brought in a steel chair and laid out Double A with a vicious attack that sent the champion to the hospital. Far from finished, you can bet for sure that Double A is plotting his revenge. The company has plenty of top tier talent including Sting, Ricky Steamboat, NWA World Tag Team Champions The Steiner Brothers, Lex Luger, and The Road Warriors.

World Class Championship Wrestling (Cult) – Paul E. Dangerously and his Dangerous Alliance's plans of making an impact on WCCW were felt in full at the company's Battle at The Alamo event when 'The Macho Man' Randy Savage made his shocking return to the company as The Alliance's newest member. After WCCW Heavyweight Champion Kerry Von Erich had just defended his title in a brutal Steel Cage Match with Steve Williams, Savage used bolt cutters to pry open the cage door and hit the ring. A physically spent Von Erich was no match to a fresh Savage's rights and lefts as an impromptu brawl escalated. When all was said and done, the 'Macho Man' dropped his infamous flying elbow and posed with Von Erich's belt – sending a clear message as to why he was back. The war with the Dangerous

Alliance had erupted at the top of the card, but the fight had already been brewing as Kevin Von Erich and Chris Adams had been battling The Alliance's Steve Austin and Jimmy Garvin after the cocky Austin turned on his former trainer and mentor Adams in a sickening attack with a steel chair. Elsewhere, WCCW packs a lot of talent such as Texas Heavyweight Champion Eric Embry, NWA World Tag Team Title contenders Ron Simmons and Butch Reed, The "American Dream" Dusty Rhodes, and other fine stars.

Independent Organizations:

American Wrestling Association (Regional) – The only other organization in North America with a valid claim to a World Heavyweight Title, the AWA still uses the approach that brought them to the dance. Problem is that many feel the same sort of product is being offered by the NWA, and better at that in the form of Calgary Stampede. The AWA's roster is loaded with aging veterans like Larry Zbyszko, Bob Backlund, Col. DeBeers, and Sgt. Slaughter, but it does have some potential stars of the future as well in a big guy named Leon White, and a fine young British fellow by the name of Steven Regal.

Championship Wrestling of Georgia (Regional) – Perhaps the only promotion without an NWA charter that works with NWA talent on a frequent basis, Championship Wrestling of Georgia has a plethora of tag team competition. The Iron Sheik and The Cuban Assassin have been trying to win fans over for the past months by saying that they have changed their ways and are now "Friends of America" but many people just aren't buying it. Freebirds Buddy Roberts and Terry Gordy, The Kongs, and other tag teams fill out the ranks.

Main Event Wrestling (Regional) – MEW is a new promotion that claims that they'll compete with the NWA, and do so by buying top talents at any price. Their current "World" Champion is the aging Andre The Giant, with Bobby The Brain Heenan serving as his manager. The association of the two with this promotion has not been met with a favorable reaction by the National Wrestling Alliance, and many feel it has even put a tarnish on Andre's surefire Hall of Fame ballot. The company keeps claiming it is "close to signing" a television deal, and "is in negotiation with several of the NWA's big names." It already has a few established stars such as The Junkyard Dog, Brutus Beefcake, and 'Hacksaw' Jim Duggan, but you have to wonder how a promotion without the funding of the NWA can afford those guys, let alone more.
